## **About This Guide**

This guidebook draws on the card indexes and index folders held in the Mitchell Library. The Mitchell Library collects and preserves materials concerning all aspects of Australian life. It is part of the State Library of New South Wales. The Guide also includes materials from the Dixon Library collection, which is housed in the Mitchell Library complex.

The references and their descriptions that comprise this guidebook have not been systematically recorded on computerised catalogues. Some items are registered on the catalogue. However, we decided to include them here in order to illustrate the breadth and richness of the materials available to the researcher. A search of the computerised catalogue will reveal other materials concerning Chinese Australians, recorded since the State Library ceased adding to the manual card indexes.

It should be noted that the Mitchell Library's collection activity extends Australia-wide. The record of Chinese Australian affairs extends well beyond the borders of New South Wales and the collection is among the best of the Chinese language historical collections held in libraries across the world.

Searches of all of the categories will reward effort. A case study on how the material may be used is presented in the concluding chapter, 'Religious Materials', which draws together items from the different catalogues that bear on Chinese and Christian religious interests and practices.

An Index to entries has been included to direct the reader to Chinese names, place names as well as selected themes.

## Using The Guide

The following codes are used throughout to indicate the index from which an item's description was taken. The codes will direct the reader to the appropriate index where the item 'call number' may be found.

**[DIXSON - 'PRINTED BOOKS']** The Dixson Library's card catalogue.

**[DIXSON - PICTURES]** The card catalogue for the Dixson's pictures.

**[ML - CARD CATALOGUE (PICTURES)]** The catalogue includes items from both the Mitchell and Dixson collections.

**[ML - MANUSCRIPTS CATALOGUE]** The Mitchell Library's manuscript collection is indexed in three card catalogues (organised alphabetically and then chronologically within subject headings). The old catalogue consists of cards only. The more recent two catalogues contain numerical references to leaf catalogues that provide descriptions of items and collections (Refer to the headings 'Chinese in Australia'; 'Chinese in New South Wales'; 'Chinese in Queensland'; and so on.).

**[ML - MANUSCRIPTS - LEAF CATALOGUE]** The Mitchell Library's Manuscripts Leaf Catalogue is arranged in alphabetical order (Items are recorded under the heading, 'Chinese in Australia').

**[ML - 'PRINTED BOOKS']** This is the largest of the Mitchell Library's card catalogues. Notwithstanding its title, it holds references to printed materials of many kinds.

**[ML - SMALL PICTURES FILE]** The Mitchell Library's Small Pictures File consists of some 30 drawers of illustrations listed by subject and then date. Many items are A4 photocopies of original material held by the Mitchell or held in private hands, and some original items such as postcards or snapshots. These files are 'self-indexing' and it is not possible to tell if holdings are complete at any one time (Most items are recorded under the heading 'Chinese in Australia').

**[SLNSW OLD CARD CATALOGUE]** These items are recorded under the heading 'Chinese in Australia' in the 'old' card catalogue of printed material in the State Library of New South Wales.

[The basic detail for each item shown in this Guide was transcribed from typed or hand-written indexes of varying quality. To the best of our knowledge, the detail is a true reflection of the contents of index entries.]
